Biomass: What is it and how does it apply to YBAC?

Biomass isn't something fisherman give a great deal of thought to, or any thought for that matter, but it affects how YBAC raises and stocks trout from the nursery. So what is biomass and why does biomass matter to YBAC?

Biomass is the number of pounds of something in an area. A simple example would be ten fisherman crowded in a small area of the Breeches on opening day of trout season. Each weighs an average of 180 pounds. 180 times ten equals the biomass of fisherman in that area of the stream. Simple, right? However, when it comes to raising fish the whole thing gets more complicated.

Anyone who has visited the nursery knows that we get our water from Lutztown run; a small spring fed run at the edge of our property. Water volume, measured in cubic feet per minute. varies throughout the year depending on the season and how much water seeps into the aquafer that feed the springs. In the Spring water volume tends to be higher with run off from melting snow and Spring rains. During the Summer months it is lower.

Now everyone knows that fish poop. Some of the waste gets pumped out when the fish runs get cleaned several times a year. The rest washes into Lutztown run which can only handle so much fish waste. Water flow volume in the run and through the nursery complicates the matter. For this reason we are limited to a biomass of 20,000 pounds of fish in the nursery at any one time as determined by the PA Department of Environmental Protection.

In aquaculture, biomass is related to fish size. Our fish are being fed super premium food, so they are bigger, healthier, and more colorful than those stocked by the Fish Commission and many other nurseries for that matter. It is the "bigger" part that affects biomass. Our fish grow at about half an inch every month on average. Size is not an issue when we get 36,000 fingerlings a few inches long in July. It becomes a problem when those 36,000 fish are eight to ten inches long in March. Bigger fish means more fish waste going into Lutztown run. All of that fish waste eventually ends up in the Yellow Breeches Creek.

So how do we know how much biomass is in the nursery? Biomass is calculated by measuring a sampling of fish. Twelve and one half inches of fish equals one pound using the PFBC rule of thumb. Since Browns grow more slowly than Rainbows, the species have to be calculated separately and added together. The total number of fish inches is divided by 12.5 to find the biomass of fish in the nursery. We count fish for stocking purposes, but it also helps to know how many we have in our nursery runs when calculating biomass.

As was said earlier, our fish grow at about half an inch per month on average, so the biomass in March can be projected in December. The Spring stocking schedule is designed to manage our biomass. Randy Raudabaugh, our nursery manager, keeps a close eye on fish growth and advises Rick Fetchko, our stocking manager, when we are getting close to our 20,000 pound limit. This year Rick scheduled a rare preseason stocking event in addition to the regular events to reduce the number of fish because they were getting big. By early June the fingerlings were received last July will be gone except for a few holdovers. The runs will be drained and cleaned and prepared to start the process all over again in July.

Nursery Report

If you have stopped by the nursery lately you may probably noticed that one of our lower runs which would normally be full of fingerlings at this time of year is empty. We did receive 13,000 fingerlings on July 7, but water flow through Lutztown run which feed the nursery is very low this Summer. With limited flow and reduced oxygen, Randy Raudabaugh made the decision, with the agreement of the Fish Commission, to only take one third of our allotment at this time. Taking the all at once could have meant an unnecessary high mortality rate. When flow rate through the nursery improves, we will get the balance of our fingerlings.

Sweat Equity

We are blessed to have many members who have the skills to perform a good deal of the work saving the club money. Invasion of the New Zealand Mud Snails

Construction of our new garage began in early June and was | Sounds like a title for a "B" grade horror movie doesn't it? Unfortunately for anglers in central PA it is a real threat to our stream ecology. New Zealand Mud Snails are tiny; only 6 mm long; about the size of a match head. They are already in three Central Pennsylvania streams and can easily transfer on waders, boots, wading staffs, etc. Mud Snails multiply rapidly and can easily crowd out native aquatic populations including insects that fish feed on as well as other aquatic life. One square foot of stream can hold as many as 28,000 of the tiny creatures. A square yard can hold as many as 500,000. They disrupt the natural ecosystem of streams by consuming all of the algae denying aquatic insects their food

> YBAC recently had their 2023 Mud Snail inspection and we passed. To date we are mud snail free. In order to be as certain as possible that we remain that way, new protocols are in place to prevent the transfer of mud snails to our nursery. First, Nursery Manager Randy Raudabaugh has received permission to purchase waders to be used exclusively at the nursery. Members helping with maintenance in the runs, counting fish, etc., must wear the waders provided by the club. No personal waders will be permitted in the runs.

> Now the question is, "how do I make sure I don't have any mud snails on my equipment and how do I get rid of them if I do?" Here is some advice from the National Park Service:

- Thoroughly clean all gear that comes in contact with water prior to moving to another location.
- Have extra waders and boots for use in infested waters only. Store them separately.
- After leaving the water, inspect waders, boots, float tubes, boats and trailers, dogs and any gear used in the water.
- Remove viable snails with a stiff brush and follow with a rinsing.
- If possible, freeze or completely dry out wet gear before reuse.
- Never transport live fish or other aquatic animals or plants from one body of water to another.

Remember, if YBAC gets an infestation of mud snails and the Yellow Breeches is snail free, we will no longer be able to put our fish in the stream. These snails can live for several days out of the water and it only takes one snail to start something that cannot be reversed.
